# International Engagement and Touring



2024 was an extraordinary year for the Melbourne International Jazz Festival—building on our 27-year legacy as Australia's premier platform for jazz and improvised music.

As well as presenting another incredible ten-day festival in October, we delivered a range of sector leadership activities, including our artist development programs, our series of inbound and outbound international engagement opportunities and our annual educational engagement initiatives—with more than 62,000 audiences and 611 artists engaging with our work, all year-round, and all over the globe.

Over 57,000 of those audiences were in attendance at the 2024 Melbourne International Jazz Festival, witnessing the exceptional talent of 547 artists from 20 countries—including the US, UK, Mexico, The Netherlands, Italy, Japan, Singapore, Somalia and more. We held 130 performances and events in 25 venues all over Melbourne, and we built on beloved traditions—with this year's once-in-a-lifetime *Jazz at the Bowl* lineup bringing in crowds of more than 8,000, and over 3,500 audiences weaving their way along the Yarra in our jubilant, New Orleans style *Second Line Street Party*.

Audiences relished the chance to see international icons like Herbie Hancock, Marcus Miller and esperanza spalding, while discovering new talent and icons-in-the-making—from Melbourne's own Audrey Powne to the UK's Nubya Garcia. As well as bringing the highest calibre of jazz from around the world to our ever-growing audiences, we supported the creation and presentation of multiple inspiring new works with 12 premieres, 6 commissions, and 15 bold and exclusive collaborations, including an outstanding co-presentation with Orchestra Victoria featuring Japan's Makoto Ozone and Melbourne's Panorama Brasil.

We were proud to present 42% of our year-round programming free of charge, ensuring that everyone can experience live music in our city and beyond. Alongside the Second Line Street Party, we welcomed nearly 10,000 people to Fed Square for a weekend of free music and films; presented a series of lunchtime jazz sessions; hosted artist talks; and created a jazzy playground for kids in partnership with ArtPlay. For the first time ever, we took over eight of the city's favourite bars and venues for Night Crawl—an epic evening of free music, showcasing the best of Melbourne's cutting-edge local jazz and neo-soul scene. We also continued to bring the jazz festival to Melbourne's west, with two full days of free programming in Footscray and Spotswood.

Throughout 2024, we maintained our firm commitment to sector development through our artist development programs and Australian export initiatives—working to develop the jazz ecology both at home and abroad, and helping to foster an inclusive and equitable sector. Our 2024 First Nations Artist Residency program leader, Bumpy, presented a profoundly moving commission, *Tooni*, following an 18-month creative development supported by MIJF in partnership with the Australian Art Orchestra. The sixth year of our Take Note gender equity initiative saw Erica Tucceri present an ambitious and triumphant commission at Howler, as well as leading 8 workshops across metro and regional high schools—inspiring the next generation of jazz.


Our educational engagement activities also provided valuable opportunities to 236 tertiary students, through our ongoing partnerships with the Melbourne Conservatorium of Music, University of Melbourne and the Sir Zelman Cowen School of Music and Performance, Monash University—connecting jazz musicians-in-training with leading international artists in a range of workshop and performance outcomes.

In a significant expansion of our international engagement and market export activity, we generated more touring opportunities for Australian artists than ever before—with eight different showcase opportunities at major jazz events across the globe, including London Jazz Festival (UK), Kanazawa Jazz Street (Japan), Wellington Jazz Festival (NZ) and Perth International Jazz Festival (Aus). We also hosted international delegates from around the world at the Melbourne International Jazz Festival—ensuring the strength of our homegrown jazz scene is witnessed by key presenters and programmers from major music global markets including the US, UK, Japan and more. Our festival and year-round initiatives would not be possible without the support of our principal government partners, Creative Victoria and Creative Australia, alongside our local government, philanthropic and corporate partners, and our community of donors. Your sustained support is invaluable. I also want to express my sincere gratitude to our generous volunteers, our dedicated Board, and our hardworking team of staff who go above and beyond to make this festival happen.

Finally, a huge thank you to the incredible artists and magnificent audiences who came out in droves to make magic happen. In a time where immense challenges face the live music sector, the continued support for our festival has bolstered and heartened us. We are so proud of what we have shared together—and can't wait to do it all again next October.

#### Jazz at the Bowl: Herbie Hancock + Marcus Miller with special guest Bumpy (US/Aus)

Now in its third year, *Jazz at the Bowl* once again brought global icons to the Sidney Myer Music Bowl stage alongside local talent. Two of the most honoured and influential musicians of our time, Herbie Hancock and Marcus Miller, headlined the event, performing to spellbound crowds of over 8,000. MIJF's 2024 First Nations Artist Residency program leader, Bumpy, opened the evening kicking off over five hours of jazz, funk and soul.

#### Second Line Street Party (US/Aus)

Building on the success of the 2023 edition, the Second Line Street *Party* returned to Melbourne—with more than 3,500 enthusiastic attendees, young and old, weaving their way along the Yarra, led by New Orleans' own TBC Brass Band.

#### Night Crawl (Aus)

Committed to highlighting Melbourne's cutting-edge jazz and neosoul scene, we launched *Night Crawl*—an evening of free music in eight of Melbourne's favourite bars and venues. Audiences of more than 9,000 witnessed the 28 performances on offer throughout the night, with many moving between venues to soak up as much as possible.

## **Premieres, Commissions & Collaborations**









MELBOURNE **W** Jazz RECITAL

As well as bringing the best jazz artists from around the globe to Melbourne, MIJF provides a platform for the presentation of new works and collaborations-this year showcasing 12 premieres and special commissions.

Arden Sounds, supported by the Metro Tunnel Creative Program, saw three new works premiere at one of Melbourne's most anticipated, yet-to-be-opened train stations. This special event featured compositions from Allara, Brandee Younger Trio (US) and Invenio, responding to the station's architecture and acoustics.

Continuing the festival's history of supporting crosscultural exchanges between Australian musicians and international artists, we presented 15 creative collaborations—including Rhapsody in Blue at 100: A Celebration of Orchestral Jazz at Hamer Hall, featuring a line-up of Melbourne and Tokyo's finest musicians. MIJF collaborated with Orchestra Victoria to present this festival highlight—one of the 15 leading cultural institutions we were proud to partner with this year.



## International Highlights

With a staggering collective tally of 34 GRAMMY wins and 99 nominations, MIJF presented a diverse lineup of international artists from 20 countries across the globe to sold-out crowds in 2024.

In addition to the opening weekend highlights of Herbie Hancock, Marcus Miller and TBC Brass Band (US), international headliners included some of the biggest names in London's booming jazz scenetenor saxophonist Nubya Garcia and artist collective Steam Down; drumming legend Antonio Sánchez (Mexico); vocalist extraordinaire Jazzmeia Horn (US); the premier harpist of her generation Brandee Younger (US); and prolific piano virtuoso Makoto Ozone (Japan). Nicole Zuraitis (US) performed at Malvern Town Hall off the back of her GRAMMY win for Best Vocal Jazz Album, and FaceSoul (Somalia) brought his gospel-infused sounds to Kindred Bandroom. Finally, five-time GRAMMY-winning bassist, vocalist and composer esperanza spalding closed the festival with a full house at Hamer Hall.



Highlight homegrown works included the premieres of MIJF's artist development program commissions from Bumpy and Erica Tucceri, Audrey Powne's acclaimed new album, and a 50th anniversary celebration for Vince Jones. We presented Take Two, a deep-listening experience first established in New York—with prolific jazz multi-instrumentalist Rai Thistlethwayte reinterpreting Stevie Wonder's landmark album, Innervisions. Also at The JazzLab, Barlines and Beyond delivered a remarkable crosscultural collaboration with Indian slide guitarist Pandit Debasish Chakraborty joining a lineup of Australian jazz legends.


Featuring local favourites and international stars at the top of their games, MIJF's Club Sessions series is a beloved tradition—offering audiences the chance to experience the festival in an intimate setting, made for music.

The rare opportunity to see Marcus Miller (US) up close over two exclusive performances was the perfect demonstration of the beauty of this series. This year's program also featured unforgettable sets from harp virtuoso Brandee Younger (US), Makoto Ozone's trio TRiNFiNiTY (Japan), Singapore's 'King of Swing' Jeremy Monteiro, Italian jazz guitarist Federico Casagrande and multimedia specialists Tin Men and the Telephone (Netherlands). Local highlights included Sunny Kim and Peter Knight's collaboration Bright Splinters, Rai Thistlethwayte's unique reinterpretation of Stevie Wonder's *Innervisions* in Take Two, and Mandeng Groove's fresh, energetic tunes.

Late Night Jams returned with Hue Blanes Trio and Mina Yu Trio leading a series of popular improvised jams both weekends of the festival, celebrating everything we love about jazz.

#### MIJF was proud to present 42% of our yearround programming free of charge—ensuring as many audiences as possible have access to world-class music.

Our community program focuses on increasing access and participation to the genre through the presentation of free and family programming across Melbourne, drawing on a range of partnerships to increase the reach and impact of the artform while inviting new audiences to engage with the festival.

Three days of world-class, free performances and a series of jazz films at Fed Square kicked off our free programming in Melbourne's CBDalso featuring the Second Line Street Party, our lunchtime jazz series at St James Courtyard, and a participatory jazz-themed play-space for children, in partnership with ArtPlay.

We were proud to partner once again with Maribyrnong City Council to bring jazz out west, with a free afternoon of live music at three of Footscray's favourite venues, and we brought local jazz excellence back to Spotswood's foodie playground, Grazeland.

#### **First Nations Artist Residency Program**

Melbourne International Jazz Festival (MIJF) acknowledges the incredible contribution First Peoples make to art and musicmaking, and strives to foster an environment and a sector in which First Nations musicians play a central role in shaping the unique sound and style of Australian jazz and improvised music.

Presented in a partnership between MIJF and the Australian Art Orchestra (AAO), the First Nations Artist Residency Program is an artistic and professional development initiative that supports the career development of a First Nations musician. In 2024, program leader Bumpy presented her deeply moving and personal commission, Tooni at Arts Centre Melbourne's Fairfax Studio. Bumpy was supported to develop the work over an 18-month period, including travelling to Noongar Boodja with her mother. Bumpy said, "The trip back home with my family was an incredible reminder of the power that runs in my blood. A reminder to share stories with our old people and deeply listen. To step out and see how impactful the people directly around us are. And to continue practising your sovereign rights, cultural practices and language".

In August, MIJF and the AAO announced Kamilaroi percussionist Adam Manning as the 2024/25 First Nations Artist Residency program leader, taking the reigns from Bumpy as he develops his new work for the 2025 festival.

#### Take Note – Gender Equity & **Artist Development Initiative**

As a national sector leader, MIJF seeks to shape a diverse, equitable, creative, innovative and thriving Australian jazz sector. Take Note is MIJF's annual artist development and gender equity initiative-developed in response to the significant under-representation of women and gender-diverse instrumentalists in the Australian music industry.

In 2024, flutist, composer and producer Erica Tucceri became MIJF's sixth Take Note Leader. She presented her ambitious and triumphant commission at the 2024 festivaland her 10-piece ensemble had audiences enthralled by her soulful flute, lush strings, and powerhouse rhythm section.

Tucceri also led workshops in eight regional and metropolitan high schools-a key component of the Take Note program's aim to celebrate and promote women and gender diverse musicians both on stage and in high schools across Victoria.

#### **Education Partnerships**

University of Melbourne: Masters and Apprentices & Conjuress
Monash University: Jazz Futures

Embedded in our artistic program, our partnerships with both the Melbourne Conservatorium of Music, University of Melbourne and Sir Zelman Cowen School of Music and Performance, Monash University support tertiary music students to learn from, collaborate and perform with leading international musicians.

MIJF 2024 featured two public performance outcomes at The JazzLab as the culmination of a series of intensive rehearsals: festival headliner Antonio Sánchez (Mexico) performing alongside students from the Sir Zelman Cowen School of Music and Performance, and Kira Kira's Satoko Fujji and Natsuki Tamura (Japan) bringing their avant-garde approach to the stage with students of the Melbourne Conservatorium of Music, University of Melbourne.

These workshops and performances—in addition to the University of Melbourne's Conjuress ensemble as the opening act for Nicole Zuraitis' (US) performance at Malvern Town Hall—were a vibrant celebration of the next generation of jazz.

International Engagement and Touring

MIJF's growing international engagement program saw 25 Australian artists presented on major global stages in 2024.

We toured to Kanazawa Jazz Street in Japan for the first time, presenting two performances of acclaimed electric bassist Christopher Hale's cross-cultural collaboration, Ritual Diamonds. In November, we returned to London Jazz Festival this time presenting five Australian ensembles across two showcases at the Barbican Centre and Kings Place. Alongside these showcases, we held an industry reception, maintaining our strong international connections and providing valuable networking opportunities for Australian artists.

In addition, we supported and brokered touring opportunities for 2023 MIJF artists to perform at the Wellington Jazz Festival and Perth International Jazz Festival.

Our annual festival serves as a key opportunity for Australian artists to connect with international artists, industry and presenters. In 2024 we invited major presenters from around the world (New York, London, Wellington and Tokyo), exposing them to some of the incredible Australian work on offer, including the following artists who comprise MIJF's core group of participants for export activity in 2025:




